Eagle Creek Greenway Phase I Bioblitz

On June 10 and 11, Portage Park District hosted its 2022 Bioblitz at our Eagle Creek Greenway Preserve in Hiram Twp. A bioblitz is a set time period in which participants try to discover, observe and identify as many species of living organisms as possible within a given area. A bioblitz is an invaluable tool, amassing a large amount of meaningful information to guide natural resource management and future park developments.

Participants included skilled professionals and volunteers that

specialize in identifying various groups of plant and animal life. Many are folks who routinely work alongside us in conservation as team members from other park districts, state agencies, and environmental firms. Organizations who attended this year's bioblitz: Davey Resource Group, EnviroScience, Firem Forestry Consulting, Geauga Park District, Medina County Park District, Summit Metroparks, Cleveland Metroparks, Ohio Department of Natural Areas and Preserves, Hiram College, Kent State University, The Nature Conservancy and Northeast Ohio Native Plant Society.

Additional help was provided by staff and students from Hiram College's James H. Barrow Field Station and Kent State University, along with Portage Park District's volunteers and staff. Over 60 people contributed to the success of this event. We are grateful to have such a strong, supportive collective of fellow conservationists and volunteers willing to devote their time and expertise to our efforts!


To date, we have tallies of nearly **400 plant species and over 130 animal species** observed and identified during the two-day event! The final results are pending further processing. These numbers are a true testament to the biodiversity being protected and conserved at Eagle Creek Greenway Preserve.


